

WHAT'S IN A NUMBER? Thoughts from the Pastor

Attendance and Membership

There is some good news to share about the state of our church. As I write, my daffodils are jutting 3 or 4 inches out of the cold, brown dirt. They give me hope that spring is coming, although the winter has been long and cold. So it is with two statistics we recently reported to the Annual Conference, as we do every year.

First, our average annual attendance has gone up...by 1! Second, our membership has increased...by 1! It doesn't sound like big news, but consider this: we have halted a steady decline.

All numbers tell a story. The story about our attendance is that the sanctuary at the late service on regular Sunday mornings may look emptier, but our early service and special Sundays draw members and guests into the church. The story of our membership numbers is that in 2009 we removed dozens of inactive members from our rolls, after repeated attempts to contact them. And it is from that new, lower number that we have also increased. Only by one.

But, oh the power of ONE! One is not simply a number; it represents one person reached for Christ. It represents one person inspired by a Bible reading, one person moved by a choir anthem, one person welcomed into God's family. That is the blessing of one. We build the church, one by one by one.

Our Community Impact, By the Numbers

Another item of interest to me was a recent article in the Philadelphia Inquirer by David O'Reilly that cites a study that answers a question we ask ourselves in the church: **Are we relevant to the community?** Are we having an impact? The article described the "economic halo" effect that churches have. This is a way of measuring a church's economic effect on its surrounding community using 54 value categories. Think about all of the ways our church is a positive economic force: we house a daycare that provides jobs, we buy paper and cleaning supplies, we purchase food for church events, we pay a piano tuner and organ repairman, the pastor has her clergy robes cleaned at the dry cleaner, etc. The study also calculated intangibles like teaching children moral values, saving marriages (counseling), and others. They even measured trees on the property of churches!

If you consider all these factors, surely we would be missed if we weren't here. And certainly we are having an impact in Willow Grove and beyond. So pray for our congregation this Lenten season, and consider how your gifts of time, talent and money will help us stay strong and grow, for God's sake, for your sake, for the sake of our neighbors and the world.

TRUSTEES REPORT

The trustees and their helpers have been very busy since the day after Christmas when Willow Grove experienced the first of this winter's many snowfalls. Thanks to the Mathers crew who were dependable and quick to plow the parking lot, shovel and clear the walks, and spread ice-melt on what was an every week task throughout the month of January.

In February, the trustees, in consultation with the finance committee, negotiated another one-year lease with Comcast for ten parking spaces. Their employees and vehicles are permitted to use our lot during business hours Monday through Friday.

At the end of February, master painter Chuck Staley picked up his roller and brush and painted the first-floor hallway from the driveway stairwell to the education building. It looks clean and fresh. The trustees ask everyone to **use the many bulletin boards and tack strips** when hanging notices, posters, artwork and other items. **Please do not stick anything to the walls, floors or ceilings.** Often when items are removed, an unsightly residue remains. In addition, it makes for extra work when cleaning and painting are to be done.

Speaking of cleaning, **April 16 has been designated spring clean-up day**. An army of worker bees are needed to spruce up the church prior to Easter. Please come any time between 8:00am and 1:00pm. Come when you can; leave when you must. Bring your favorite cleaning supplies.

The church van is prepared for increased use with the approach of better weather and activities that require transportation. Regular maintenance has been attended to, including the purchase of new tires, to provide reliability and safety for the riders.

Already the daffodils and spring-flowering bulbs have begun to come up in the front garden, and soon the cherry trees will blossom. The trustees are seeking several people to help in keeping the flower beds looking cared for and the weeds among the missing. Please let Ken Graupner know if you have an interest in this.

Remember to turn out all lights when you leave a room. One by one new high-efficiency light bulbs have been replacing the old bulbs as they burn

out, but turning lights off still saves energy and money. Be sure there is no water running when you leave the kitchen or lavatories. If you want to hold an event or use a room, please fill out a facilities form available in the office. This is the most reliable way to inform the trustees of the specifics of your plans and allow them to support your activity.

As always, many people contribute their time and skills behind the scenes to care for our building and grounds. The trustees appreciate everyone's willingness to help. Many, many thanks.
